CONTENTS:

Explanation of the significance and importance of the forthcoming timber production campaign in view of the increase of the production programme of the Administration of the Solovetsky Camps of Special Destination in 1929-30 economic year and declaration of measures for stimulation of paid officials and prisoners engaged in timber camps.

Instructions issued by the Party and by the Government to catch up and overtake the capitalist countries—in respect of technical progress—demand that industrialisation of the U.S.S.R. should proceed with the utmost speed.

The results of the 1928-9 economic year, the first year of the Five Years' Plan, surpassed, in many branches of industry, all the planned programmes, and convinced all those who objected to the proposed tempo of industrialisation in the practicability of the Five Years' Plan and in the possibility to move more quickly towards Socialism.

(196 THE CONSCRIPTION OF A PEOPLE

Special attention is being paid in the programme of the Five Years' Plan for the year 1929-30 to the matter of exports, and, in particular, to the export of timber materials which are one of the items of revenue in our Socialist budget.

The Administration of the Solovetsky Camps, which occupy not the last place in the general plan of timber production of the U.S.S.R., have decided upon the increase of their timber production programme by over 300 per cent. in comparison with the previous year.

The fulfilment of this most responsible task will depend, to a large extent, upon the realisation of their duties and obligations by every paid collaborator and prisoner. Therefore all paid collaborators and prisoners, at whatever work they are engaged or whatever posts they occupy in the Administration of the Solovetsky Camps of Special Destination (USLON'), must mobilise all their energies, knowledge, activities, firmness in their decisions, and promptitude in execution, in order to successfully fulfil the task imposed on the Administration of the Solovetsky Camps of Special Destination (USLON').

Whi'e noting the part played by administrative workers and by the labourers who are directly connected with fulfilment of the forthcoming programme of timber production in 1929-30, the following notice is given to everybody:

- 1. Prisoners who are to fulfil the tasks—minimum output—imposed on them in connection with the increased programmes of timber production, will be entitled in 1929-30, apart from reducing the term of punishment, to liberation before the expiration of their term of punishment, and also to engagement, upon liberation, as paid employees.
- 2. By means of progressive scale of premiums at the timber campa and saw-mills all those who zealously fulfil their tasks, will be entitled to the increased bonuses.

.The above encouragements will be applied to the ad-

ministrative staff (overseers, guards, foremen, etc.) upon whose initiative, activity and organising ability will de-

pend the success of the work.

While noting positive results of the labour competition adopted in the Solovetsky Camps of Special Destination, the local party and public organisations are invited to spread initiative in regard to competition also at the timber camps; this will ensure the proper tempo of work and guarantee 100 per cent. of the fulfilment of the obligations.

VPO [presumably 'Military Industrial Department'] together with EKO [presumably 'Economic Department'] have to develop the most energetic activities for explaining the part which the Administration of the Solovetsky Camps of Special Destination are to play in timber production in connection with the programme of

the Five Years' Plan for 1929-30.

This Order is to be read in all administrative Departments, branches, detachments and camps, and to be hung up in conspicuous places.
